In a recent editorial in Mainline Modeler, publisher Bob Hundman questions whether or not the NMRA will survive. To quote, "If privately organized shows are collectively providing the same or better ... service as the NMRA, at lower cost, then where will that leave the NMRA?"

It's a valid point. The NMRA, long the only game in town, has to deal with the fact that there are now alternatives. Locally, there is the Mini-Bunch narrow gauge group, where I presented a clinic last fall. The National Narrow Gauge Convention is held every year, and had more and better models than at most NMRA nationals I've attended. The event that precipitated Bob Hundman's editorial was apparently of extremely high quality.

So, where does that leave the NMRA? It presents the same problem as any other competitive marketplace - offer a better, or at least competitive, product, or become a part of history.

What is the NMRA's product - what does the NMRA actually do? For one, it

produces the standards that we all rely upon. But every modeler benefits from that, regardless of whether or not you are a member or not. It's not a selling point, except by appealing to the intellect: "By being a member, you're helping to keep modeling products interoperable."

Well, what else? There's the fellowship of spending a few hours a month with the local Division folks at the meeting, or the Regional Convention, or the National Convention. But, if you don't go to the conventions, you're just as well off with a local modeling club. If the local Division isn't active, then there's nothing to offer there. Fortunately, we have a very active Division, in a very active Region. That's a big reason that the Mid-Central Region often leads the nation in number of Merit Awards and Achievement Certificates awarded each year.

There's the modeling information that you can get through the conventions and meetings - modelers that are nationally known, and who are willing to share their tech-

niques or talk shop. Some clubs have a regular clinic program, though - the NMRA is not unique in that, either. And as mentioned earlier, there are alternatives to the NMRA conventions.

There are lots of options out there. If you get this newsletter, you're probably a member of the NMRA. You're also likely to be involved in at least one club. So, what I'm interested in is this:

Why are you a member of the NMRA?

What do you enjoy most about it?

What do you like least about it?

What could be done to make it a better value to you?

Please write or email me the answers to these questions. I truly want to know. We'll put the answers into a future issue of the *Call Board*, and I'll also pass them on to the Region and to National. After all, this is *your* NMRA.
